Launch:

The children will take part in an Ancient Egyptian immersion day, exploring mummification, jewellery, Egyptian culture and trying to escape from our Ancient Egypt escape room! This will provide them with the opportunity to think of areas of Egyptian life they want to explore in more depth.

What was life really like for Ancient Egyptians?

Key dates:

15th January: Times Tables Challenge Day (more information will be sent in a ParentMail).

24th January: speaker from The Dorset History Centre.

3lst January: Topic challenge due in. 5th February: Year 4. Egyptian exhibition 7th - 9th February: Hooke Court Residential.

<u>Topic Overview</u>: As historians, the children will develop their enquiry skills by using sources of evidence to ask questions and find answers about the past. This will be explored by looking through the tomb of Tutankhamun and the vast treasures found at his burial site. They will be describing the social, ethnic and religious beliefs of the Ancient Egyptian civilisation and exploring the gods they worshipped and what life was like for different people in the period. The children will be placing events, artefacts and historical figures on a timeline when learning about the rulers of Ancient Egypt. As artists, the children will develop their sculpture skills by making clay pots. They will also develop their printing skills as they work towards producing an Egyptian cartouche. As scientists, the children will identify and name a variety of living things using classification keys. They will give reasons for classifying plants and animals based on specific characteristics and recognise that environments are constantly changing, along with the dangers this can pose for specific species.

Key Vocabulary:

canopic jar pyramid dynasty scarab afterlife papyrus pharaoh pyramid ancient sculpture cartouche printing classification characteristics

Topic Challenge:

We would like the children to make their own canopic jars. We will learn about these early on in our topic. We would like the children to bring their canopic jars to school by 3lst January so we can display them and celebrate their work.

Learning Conversations:

Talk to your child about what they know about life in Ancient Egypt. What has been the most surprising fact that they have discovered so far? Were their initial preconceptions about Ancient Egyptian life accurate?
